MODEL UNITED NATIONS

Model United Nations, or Model UN, is an activity in which high school students participate in model committees where they learn about international relationships. Competitions are hosted all over the world, with a large portion of them taking place in the United States. Students of John Adams

High School participate in the competition hosted by the University of Chicago, which is known as MU-NUC. The MUNUC website defines the competition as a "four-day academic conference that provides high-school students from around the world with the opportunity to meaningfully engage with contemporary world issues, polish publicspeaking and communication skills, and become more confident and articulate global citizens." MUNUC had its 30th conference this year, which began on February 1 and ended on February 4.

Model UN at Adams has been run continuously for the last four years by the club's sponsor, Mr. Weaver. He explained why he decided to

take over the program by stating, "The person in charge before me left the school, and students still wanted to do it. I volunteered to take over, because they asked me to." Mr. Weaver also explained the importance of Model UN: "It gives them [students participating] an opportunity to see how the real United Nations works, investigate one of the United Nations committees, and the issues that those committees are involved in. [MU-NUC also] gives students an opportunity to speak in a public setting."

The president of Model UN this year, Josephine Barber, a senior and four year participant of the club, explained committee meetings by stating, "Each person, or pair of people, represent a country, and they have to talk about the issues in the perspective of that country." She also clarified, "you're not representing your own views, you are representing the country's views, so you get to learn a lot about the country and interact with a lot of people."

Interacting with others seems to be a large part of the Model UN. When asked what the point of Model UN was the vice president of the club, Amara Ball, a senior and three year participant, stated, "to come together

places, and its interesting to know how certain people come to conclusions for their country." Anna also mentioned how fun the weekend was and that she looks forwards to being in different committees in the future.

There are a variety of committees within MUNUC, which are all focused on different tasks. Each year the topic of a committee changes and they discusses something new. Ben Fecher was part of the European Council. He said, "We focused on the issue of countries that are leaving and entering the European Union, which is pretty significant right now."

> Amara Ball and Josephine Barber were part of the Social, Cultural, and Humanitarian Committee, where they discussed "access to women's health care and eventually passed a resolution." Amara explained the actual process of passing a resolution and said, "There were about six working papers [...], then they merged their working papers into draft resolutions, so we were given the draft resolutions, and then we read over them and debated the two, then passed one of them as a resolution."

> Mr. Weaver also talked about a potential class he wishes he could teach involving Model UN and topics related to it. He said, "I wish we had a class, where we could

actually teach more about the process, so they could have an opportunity to win some awards." Many students are unaware of the club, and participants of Model UN often go to their first conference with little knowledge on what is actually about to take place. A class could help spark interest in Model UN and possibly inform participants of how to make the most of their committee meetings. However, participants can join, learn, and enjoy their experiences regardless of this. Look into Model UN next year!

"I have to say Mrs. Arney and Mr. Harvey have made quite a big impact considering that I had them both for two years in which I grew immensely through their classes," she explained. As for her favorite moment at Adams, she said, "My top two favorite moments at Adams are managing the football and basketball teams and doing mock trial. [...] Both of these groups have become a family to me."



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UPCOMING YOUTH SYMPHONY CONCERT: MUSIC WITH FRIENDS CLAIRE STOWE - REPORTER

The friendly conversations die out and the room experiences a brief moment of silence before launching into the menacing opening of Holst's Mars or brightly singing the first chords of Williams' Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis. Whatever the repertoire, being a world-premiere or a prominent symphony, the South Bend Youth Symphony Orchestra (SBYSO) will learn it, perform it, enjoy it, and share it with the community, as they have been doing for 50 years. On Sunday, February 25 at 4:00 PM the SBYSO will perform a variety of well-loved pieces here in our own John Adams High School Auditorium. The concert, with a theme of "Music with Friends," will feature two SBYSO student soloists playing Greig's Piano Concerto in A major and Kabalevsky's Cello Concerto no. 1, as well as several other renowned soloists, including Natasha Stojanovska on Gershwin's famous Rhapsody in Blue and IUSB's string quartet in residence the Euclid Quartet with Vaughan Williams' Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis. In addition to these, the orchestra will be performing Mars: The Bringer of War by Gustav Holst, a movement in his famous orchestral suite The Planets.

"Originally when I was programming this concert, my idea was for the concert to be 'Greatest Hits' and perform some of the pieces which were real highlights over my seven-year tenure," Dr. Robert Boardman, music director and conductor, said about the music. "But it became clear that the theme of the concert was more an expression of the richness of our musical community, students, faculty, music teachers, and professional soloists."

The 2017-18 season is very important to the orchestra, being the 50th anniversary of the group. "We are featuring four collaborations on this concert and paying homage to the inception of the SBYSO 50 years ago. The SBYSO was formed as a result of the cooperative efforts of the South Bend Community School Corporation and IUSB. Thus, IUSB's ensemble in residence, the Euclid Quartet, coming with us to John Adams is symbolic, and substantive in our continued acknowledgment of support and cooperation in the community," Boardman commented.

This upcoming concert is not the only noticeable event of the season. Many in the group are greatly looking forward to the May 24th Gala concert, which will be held at the Debartalo Performing Arts Center and will feature several world-class musicians who got their start in SBYSO. Robert Spano, music director of the Atlanta

Symphony, will be conducting the first movement of Dvorak's Cello Concerto, performed by Austin Huntington. Both of these elite musicians are SBYSO alumnus. "We will also perform the gloriously roof-raising finale of Mahler's 'Resurrection' Symphony no. 2 in collaboration with no less than five different choruses. It will be a night to remember!" Boardman says, encompassing the excitement of everyone involved.

Boardman has been working with the SBYSO for seven years, and believes that the orchestra has come along way, both throughout his career and throughout this season. "What is noticeable is just how big a sound the orchestra can make. We have almost a hundred members now. When I started we only had 53." But SBYSO doesn't only focus on the music, there is fun and friendships involved too, something Boardman has also seen a drastic shift in. "I love the energy and enthusiasm of the orchestra this year," he commented, when asked about the group's progress. "I feel that the orchestra is more social-a lot more people are making friends."

Everyone involved with SBYSO is greatly looking forward to the February 25th concert, and to the excitement the remainder of the season is sure to hold. The joy of making music with friends is evident, and the upcoming concert is sure to be a great event for all in attendance.

MOCK TRIAL REGIONALS

This is my first year as a part of the Mock Trial Program at John Adams, meaning that it was my first time at Mock Trial Regionals. It is here that I discovered what a tense, tiring, competitive, and fun competition Mock Trial is. As an attorney, I directly examined the character of "Lou Slipps," a blog writer and journalist, and the character "Sergeant Jay Hull," an analyst for the cybercrimes unit of Indiana. In addition to examining these characters, I was also the closing speaker for the defense side. I was a part of an amazing team, known as "Scape Ghosts," consisting of Gabe Trevino, Danielle Boling, Paul Mellor, Abby Myers, Basil Thurin, and Filomena Horvath. Out of 23 teams, our team was able to place tenth and are now moving on to the state competition on March 3 in Indianapolis.

This event was held by the Indiana Bar Foundation, who hold all of the state and regional competitions in Indiana. A total of 23 teams throughout Michiana met at Adams High School to compete. To hold as judges, the Indiana Bar Foundation was able to recruit volunteers from around the area, such as college law students, and working lawyers. When judging each team individually, the schools from which each team came from was disclosed, in order to avoid any biased judging. However, the schools who did participate were Adams, Clay, Trinity, and St. Joe. The event started at 8 AM on February 10 and continued until 9 PM that same night. In total, there were three scrimmages, each containing three judges, two scoring and one judging. Each team appeared to have worked countless hours by exhibiting great confidence, arguments, and presentation. Each scrimmage was adrenaline filled and very exciting, while at the same time being intense within each team.

The most anxious part of all was waiting for the announcer to read off the names of the top 11 teams. After every team's name was read, a large array of cheers and claps occurred. The team then went up on stage to receive their plaque.
