In the front hallway of Adams a bench is covered with a large sheet of paper: signatures, big and small and leaving no blank space, catch the eye. Students stop, either to sign their own name next to the many others or to simply reminisce and absorb the touching memorial. Propped up against the wall behind it are memorabilia and photos, including a photo of the Adams 1974 Boys' Basketball Sectional Championship Team. Last week, however, this bench held a different story. Instead of flowers and memories Mr. Jeff Hull sat on that bench, answering the questions of lost freshmen or helping students with their lockers or schedules or whatever else they needed, all while doing his part in keeping our school safe and prosperous.



On Saturday, September 14th Mr. Hull, passed away after being involved in a car accident.

According to Adams principal Mr. Seitz, "Mr. Hull worked at John Adams High School and the South Bend Community School Corporation for over 30 years in many different capacities. Mr. Hull spent time as a security guard, coach, IHSAA referee, mentor, scorekeeper, ticket taker, announcer, chaperone and anything that was asked of him. Jeff Hull loved John Adams High School. Mr. Hull's entire family graduated from Adams, including Jeff, who was a proud member of the Class of 1975. Jeff was extremely proud to be a member of the 1974 Boys' Basketball Sectional Cham-

pionship Team coached by legendary coach Dave Hadaway. Most recently Jeff spent the fall seasons keeping score and announcing at our volleyball games and taking tickets at football games. In the winter, Jeff kept the scorebook for the girls' basketball games and worked during the boys' basketball games. In the spring, Jeff umpired IHSAA softball games and made it a point to attend as many Adams' events as possible. Jeff would always chaperone Prom, Midwinter and his favorite dance, MORP. Jeff Hull always displayed great character and work ethic. He never missed a day of work and always put the students of John Adams High School first."

Mr. Hull dedicated his life to Adams and to making the school a better place. "He truly loved Adams and the people of Adams," Principal James Seitz stated. "Many times Mr. Hull would tell a kid to pull their pants up or to get to class; students only saw this side of him. What they did not see was Mr. Hull ask an administrator later in the day if that student was doing well. He truly cared about the students." Being so involved with the Adams community, Mr. Hull touched the lives of many students, teachers, and administrators. "A few of us were able to build a relationship with Mr. Hull as students and then as educators," Seitz comments, who attended Adams as a student while Mr. Hull acted as a coach and a security guard.

Constantly dedicated to improving the atmosphere of Adams, Mr. Hull worked tirelessly in many capacities to help and support students and faculty alike. He made countless connections with any and all of those affiliated with Adams, acting simultaneously as a mentor, companion, and motivator, constantly encouraging success with his dedicated presence.

"Jeff was more than an employee. Jeff was a family member of John Adams High School," Seitz added, "he will be missed in more ways than I think we even know at this time."

Senior Spotlight: Ira Armstead

Hailing from Aurora, Colorado, the most decorated football player in the area, Iraken Armstead has been a 3-year starter at quarterback for the Eagles varsity squad.



Since his sophomore year, colleges from all around the Midwest have been eyeing down the future all-american, including: Western Michigan University, Central Michigan University, Eastern Michigan University, The University of Toledo, and the University of Cincinnati. According to Semper Fidelis/ Max Preps, he has won 10 "Player of the Game" awards and last year he accumulated a total of 2,202 passing yards, 1,104 rushing yards, 12 passing touchdowns, and 17 rushing touchdowns. The statistics that he has brought to the position so far have made him the definition of a dualthreat quarterback. His achievements are the aspiration of any high school football player. Additionally, his future is already set in front of him. Armstead has been invited to campuses all around the Midwest and he has spoken with many Division I coaches,

but residing 700 miles away is his college of choice. After receiving an invite to the University of Virginia, a Top 25 team and elite Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) competitor, Armstead said that his choice for college became very easy. When asked how he made his decision Ira said, "It was honestly my gut feeling and the culture of the school as well as the intensity of the football team". Additionally, he commented that it

feels relieving to be out of the recruiting process and committed to a Division I team.

"It feels good to be committed but I expected it". In the current football season, the Adams team has felt some tough losses with two games being

decided by two points or less. Rallying the troops during practice and in the locker room, Ira typically reminds his teammates to constantly keep their heads in a positive direction and not crack under the pressure. One of the most important aspects of these games, he claims, is to have fun and just play the game.

Outside of football Ira spends his time doing multiple activities that add to his overall picture. Just as he picks apart defenses on the field, Armstead likes to do the same in games of chess in between his friends and family. In the hallway and in the classroom one may spot him with a Rubix cube or other physical, brain-teasing puzzles. Other sports he likes to compete in include fishing and bowling. In the future the Adams QB would like to study the inner workings of the human mind and the businesses of mod-

ern corporate America through the psychology and business programs at the University of Virginia. His advice to underclassmen would be "Stay focused and work hard and good things will happen".

Niles Scream Park Preview

The Niles Scream Park has been in operation since 1974, so this marks the 46th consecutive year. The gates for this season opened on Friday, September 13th. Through the month of September the park will be open on Fridays and Saturdays, then starting in October, the park will be open Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays. Of course, October 31st, Halloween, will be a night of operation. The last chance events for the scare fest, also known as the Black Out event, will be the first weekend of November, November 1st and 2nd.

The Scream Park has been nationally recognized as one of the top haunted attractions in the country. For the past six years the Haunted Attraction Magazine said the Niles Scream Park in one of the "Top 31 Must-See Haunted Attractions". Also the park is known for its donations to various organizations. Niles Scream Park is a nonprofit community project, which means that all of the works are volunteers, about 200 volunteers are needed per night to keep the show going. Since 1996 more than \$1.9 million have been donated, that includes donations to the Niles Scream Park funded college scholarships for students at Niles, Brandywine, Dowagiac, Cassopolis, and Edwardsburg High School.



This year there are five main attractions, the Niles Haunted House, N'awlins Nightmare, Deadwood, The Field of Screams, and the Dark Terror-tory Haunted Hayride. The haunted house is the main attraction, there are over 100 different paths through it, each one just as scary as the last. Each year the room, theme, and sound effects are changed to provide a new and unique experience. N'awlins Nightmare is a New Orleans experience, where the patron journeys through the dark streets with the Queen of Voodoo. Deadwood is an experience with the Gold Rush with unsavory vistors who brought murder to the town of Deadwood.



The Field of Screams is one of the parks most popular attractions with mazes in the Bayou and a brand new cemetery. The Dark Terror-tory Haunted
Hayride is a break from
the rest of the attractions, which includes
a mile long trail filled
with more than 30 sets
that combines horror
and comedy. In addition
to the above mentioned
attractions there are two
others, Hooded which
requires patrons to be 18
years of age and sign a
waiver before entering,
and Mini Escape Rooms

on the midway where patrons have only 5 minutes to solve

the puzzle to escape. The midway also offers many food options and games for the patrons.

The attractions range in price from \$9 to \$14, but there are also combination tickets: the Frightful Nightful includes all the 5 main attractions for \$35 (\$40 starting in October), the Adrenaline Package is a \$5 upgrade to the Frightful Nightful that includes a ticket to Hooded, and the Triple Dog Dare includes the three indoor

attractions (Niles Haunted House, N'awlins Nightmare, and Deadwood) for \$28.

I was given the opportunity to have a run through the attractions before the park officially opened on September 13th. All of the lights were on in the park, but that does not discount the scare factor. Lights or no lights and motion sensors or not, the props in the attractions come to life and send chills down your spine. The park tries to use pop culture in

their attractions, but that just adds to the scare. Some pop culture that appears in the Haunted House includes Treasure Ship,



Stephen King's IT, Stranger Things, Jack the Ripper, Silent Hill, and many more. The purpose of this is somewhat ease the fright but showing the patron something they will recognize and consider it safe, but then to pop out and put a twist on it. Walking through the attractions on a normal night, you may not notice the same details that go into everything, but with a closer look there is an outstanding amount of details in every inch of the 44 acre park.

Movie Review: IT Chapter Two SIERRA WEAVER - REPORTER

In 2017, It was released and had major box office success. This year, on September 9, It Chapter Two was released. The film stars Jessica Chastain, James McAvoy, Bill Hader, Isaiah Mustafa, Jay Ryan, James Ransone, Andy Bean, and Bill Skarsgård, and is directed by Muschietti.

The films is set 27 years after its predecessor. The "losers" are all grown up and pursuing various careers all around the country. After a series of recent murders catch Mike's (Mustafa) attention, as he is the only member of the group still living in Derry, he decides to contact his old friends and bring them back to Derry to fulfill their promise at the end of the first chapter. There is only a small issue with Mike's plan: the people who left Derry hardly remember what happened when they were children, and, when they discover the real reason Mike decided to call them, they are hesitant to stay and help fight. After realizing someone has to put a stop to Pennywise for good, or the town will continue to face brutal murder sprees every 27 years, the "losers" band together once again to take on the monster.

While there is a lot of great things the film has to offer, there are also a lot of issues with it. A large portion of the film was used to watch each of the losers reflect on their time in Derry in order to gather a "personal token" for battling Pennywise. It is hard not to accept this portion of the plot with open arms because it allows the audience to return to the child actors' storyline again, but it also feels like a "lazy" way to do this. Instead of being funny moments that allow viewers to revisit a beloved set of characters, the scenes end up distracting from the actual storyline of the film, making it hard to appreciate the flashbacks. Additionally, It Chapter Two leaves its original movie's use of creepy props and tension

to build fear behind, and returns to the stereotypical modern horror use of "jump scares." Because of this, a lot of the fear within the film feels extremely short lived and does not have as large of an impact on the audience. There were a few other issues with the movie as well, such as how flat Mike's character seemed, and the slow start to the film.

It Chapter Two is not as good as its predecessor, but it is still a fun watch. There is a lot to love about this sequel, and, while it had its issues, it was not too disappointing. Overall, It Chapter Two is definitely worth the watch regardless, especially to those who loved the first part.

He's considering either performance in symphonies for a living, or even becoming a high school band director.

"High school band requires you to have a certain level of confidence," he says. "You have to want to exceed everyone's expectations. I've met a lot of my friends and peers through music, and because of those things band is just really important to me." Dobbins not only plays music, however, but he listens to quite a bit as well. His tastes cover a wide range, but he does say, "My favorite genres are indy hip-hop and rap. I like the uniqueness of it, and it's really influenced me."

Oddly enough, Dobbins bristles a little when I ask him how it feels to be the shortest drum major. He responds, "I get the tallest podium, so technically I'm the tallest."

She has been heavily involved with some of Adam's most prestigious teams and groups, and now, as a senior, deserves recognition for her many accomplishments.

For all four of her high school years, Maddie has been running Varsity on both the Cross Country and Track team. She joined a strong group of runners her freshman year, helping the team win the City Championship and advance to Semi-State, a feat that had not been accomplished since 2004. Returning Sophomore year she helped retain the winning streak along with the other top runners. In her junior year Maddie was named a captain and immediately took a strong leadership position on the team, acting as an example both in her capacity as a runner and as a positive and inspiring teammate. Maddie began her season being named the Girls Varsity City Champion by placing first in the city meet and later advanced to Semi-state as an individual qualifier with her teammate Ivie Skube. "Running has been a really important aspect [to high school].
